

C. S. Powell ^{G-#} Funeral Held

11-4-1932

Rites for Son of Mrs. C. Powell
Held at Methodist Church
Yesterday Afternoon.

Amid impressive ceremonies conducted by the Macons and the local post of the American Legion, the body of Dr. Clifford Spencer Powell, of Deer Lodge, Montana, son of Mrs. C. Powell of this city, was laid to rest yesterday afternoon in Hazelwood Cemetery.

Funeral services were held at 3:30 at the Methodist Church with the Rev. J. W. Fowler in charge. Music was furnished by Professor Elias Blum at the organ and by Professor David E. Peck who played two violin solos with organ accompaniment.

The cortege was escorted to the cemetery by a delegation from Focht-Tennant Post of the American Legion at the request of the Deer Lodge Post of which the deceased was a member. Professor J. W. Gannaway, Grand Master of the Iowa Lodge A.F. & A.M. pronounced the Masonic ritual.

Three volleys were fired over the grave and taps sounded as the sun sank below the horizon. Thus ended the life and career of one of Grinnell's illustrious sons.

Dr. Powell was graduated from Grinnell college in 1913 and from Rush Medical college of the University of Chicago in 1917. Since 1917 he has been practicing medicine and surgery at Deer Lodge, Montana.

His career was cut short by an illness that developed about six months ago. The best medical talent of the country was called to his assistance, but death finally claimed him at the Washington Boulevard Hospital in Chicago, Monday, October 31, at 7:30 o'clock.

Besides his wife, who was the daughter of the late Rev. and Mrs. J. M. Brown of this city, he leaves two sons, his mother, and many other close relatives to mourn his loss.

Honorary pall bearers were: Dr. E. B. Wiley, Dr. O. F. Parish, Dr. E. E. Harris and Dr. E. F. Talbott. Active pall bearers were: Ross Coutts, E. O. Porter, Homer Lowrey, George Clifton, John McBlain and A. M. Burton.

Clifton Spencer Powell was born at Grinnell, Iowa, November 7, 1889 and died in Chicago, Ill. October 31, 1932, aged 42 years 11 months and 24 days. His boyhood was spent at Odebolt Iowa, where he graduated from High School in 1908. Entering Grinnell college that fall, he devoted his attention to preparatory work for medicine, receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in 1913.

His medical studies were continued at Rush Medical college of the University of Chicago and in 1917 the degree of Doctor of Medicine was conferred upon him by that institution. Internships followed at the Washington Boulevard Hospital, Chicago, Presbyterian Hospital, Chicago, and Royal Victoria
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
