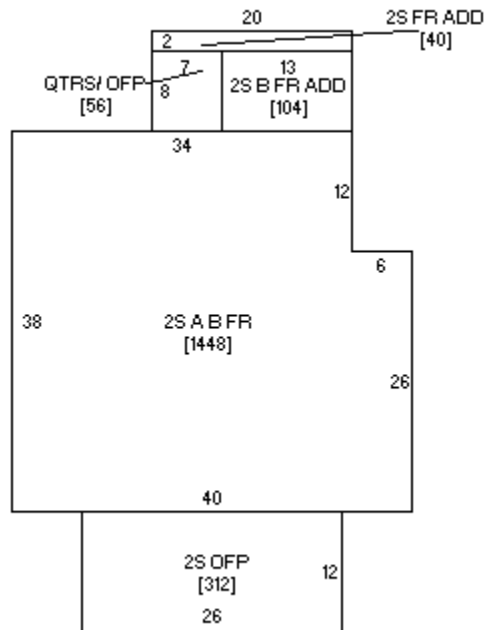

Chapter 16: Nollen House

Nollen House, the stately white-columned house at 1121 Park Street across from Goodnow Hall on the Grinnell College campus, originally was a private home, probably the most prominent of a streetful of private homes built adjacent to the college in what undoubtedly was considered one of the most advantageous places to establish one's residence.

A Southern belle or a Greek goddess in a row of Victorian ladies, the house may have had more lives than the proverbial cat.

The house was acquired by the college in 1937, and for many years was dubbed "The White House" because its perfectly proportioned architecture makes it resemble a house in Washington, D.C., by that name.

'Only one White House'

But "there is only one White House," declared President Glenn Leggett in 1972 when he renamed the building Nollen House for John Scholte Nollen, the college's president from 1931 to 1940, as it became the location for the offices of the college's chief administrative officers.

The house was built in 1902 by David S. Morrison, son of the founder of the Morrison Glove Factory, and his wife, Fannie. Morrison headed the business at the time. Prior to building the house, the Morrisons lived at 525 Main Street, half a block north of the former South School, now the site of Davis School.

Architect for the Morrisons' new house was Eugene H. Taylor, a member of the Grinnell College class of 1876, who was a partner in the architectural firm of Josselyn and Taylor Co., in Cedar Rapids. Taylor also designed the building for Uncle Sam's Club, built in 1902.

Architect a Newburg resident

Taylor's architectural career took a somewhat circuitous route. Following his graduation from Grinnell, he was a student at the Institute of Technology in Boston, Mass., for two years. He then moved to Newburg where he appeared to be a sort of one-man-band: its first inhabitant, he was a surveyor, postmaster, railroad agent, and a grain, lumber and coal dealer from 1878 to 1880. From 1880 to 1882 he was a

draftsman in Chicago before forming the Cedar Rapids architectural firm, which later designed the Iowa Building for the Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893.

David Morrison died in 1919 and Mrs. Morrison apparently lived in the house until her death in 1934. Their son Frederic Morrison, who succeeded his father as director of the glove factory, resided at the corner of Tenth Avenue and Park Street, now the site of the college's Black Cultural Center, with his wife, Fay, and their five children.

Son transfers property

In 1937 Frederic Morrison arranged for the transfer by deed of his parents' Park Street home to the college in exchange for two lots in the Moyle and Pooley subdivision northwest of Tenth Avenue and West Street owned by the college, plus tuition for his two sons Mark and Paul Morrison.

Once in the college's hands, the property began to fill a succession of functions.

Plans to make the house a student recreational center were outlined in the Oct. 13, 1937, issue of the college's student newspaper, *The Scarlet and Black*, which reported that at a student leaders' conference it was referred to as a student union and fieldhouse to improve social life on campus with informal recreation. "The White House, first house south of the dean of men's office, should be opened as a means of broadening Grinnell's social life," the editors averred.

Expand recreation plans

Conference participants also recommended that golfing be encouraged by making arrangements with the country club for general privileges and that tennis facilities for men should be improved. A mixed bridge tournament committee was appointed consisting of Alice Meacham and Marion Wood. The White House would need a responsible hostess, it was noted, and should provide for refreshments to be sold and serve as headquarters for campus organizations.

Furniture for a lounge and sitting room was purchased with funds from the quadrangle social fund and the White House was cleaned from top to toe on "Improvement Days." The project also offered a "chance to do constructive work for the student government association in connection with 'Hell Week,'" the *Scarlet and Black* noted.

referring to the custom of initiating new students with outrageous and sometimes dangerous activities. The outside of the building was washed, the basement and attic were cleaned, the basement white-washed and the floors polished. Freshman women were to sew drapes for the house.

Also installed was a connection to the house from the college's central heating system.

Scheduled to be opened the first week after Thanksgiving vacation in 1937, the house actually opened in January, 1938, with a dedication on Jan. 21. Hazel Bishop of Los Angeles, Calif., was the hostess and headquarters were provided for the Cyclone, the college's yearbook, and the Town Men's Club.

"The White House is a favorite campus hangout for bridge fiends, pingpong enthusiasts, jitterbugs and just plain loungers," The Cyclone reported in its 1940 edition.

In 1941, the Cyclone reported that "Mrs. Brock is a gracious hostess and Mrs. Tyree serves the best hot chocolate on either side of the Mississippi."

Becomes O.C.S. headquarters

In 1942 the White House became headquarters for an Officers Candidate School established at the college during World War II, an Army Special Training Program (ASTP) unit and a Student Training and Reclassification (STAR) unit. Recreation facilities were moved to the former faculty club at Seventh Avenue and Broad Street, now the home of John and Barbara Kleinschmidt. "The traditional White House spirit prevails," The Cyclone reported in 1943 but "it was an unhappy day for Grinnell students when the White House received a coat of G.I. paint and a sign in front read 'Army Headquarters, O.C.S. No. 2.'"

from the Sioux City Air Base, until the construction of the Grinnell College Forum.

The Officers' Candidate School closed in 1944, and from 1946 to 1959 the White House was used for faculty housing. Among its distinguished occupants were Dr. Winston King, dean of the chapel, and his wife Jocelyn King on the main floor and Henry Alden, the college's librarian, on the second floor.

Administrative offices move

From 1959 to 1961 the White House housed the college's art department as well as faculty housing and from 1961 to 1971 the building was occupied as an off-campus residence by 12 women students who were relocated to the house at 1130 East Street as the college prepared to move its administrative offices to the site, according to the *Scarlet and Black* of Feb. 26, 1972.

The reinvented building was to include the offices of the president of the college, the dean of administration, the dean of the college, the registrar and the business office, according to the article.

"Renovation has taken a full year because it is being done by physical plant employees as they have time," it added. Furnishings essentially were to be those used in the Burling Library offices where those officers previously had been located.

Renovation included improvements to the exterior, new lighting,

Furniture for the new White House was delayed in arriving from Chicago, the *Scarlet and Black* reported Nov. 25, 1942, because government regulations forbade transportation on trains unless for vital war needs and trucking companies could not contract to move unless assured of a return load. The recreation center subsequently was housed in a building on central campus, formerly the Officers Club

heating and air conditioning for a total of \$40,000. "The library committee, headed by Donald Irving, English, will submit plans to Dean Walker for use of the space in Burling. The added space hopefully will permit periodicals stored in the downtown office building to be transferred to Burling," the article continued.

The registrar and business manager were to occupy the first floor of the house while the president, dean of the college and dean of administration were to occupy offices on the second floor "where they may enjoy the nice view," the *Scarlet and Black* reported in its issue of Aug. 25, 1972.

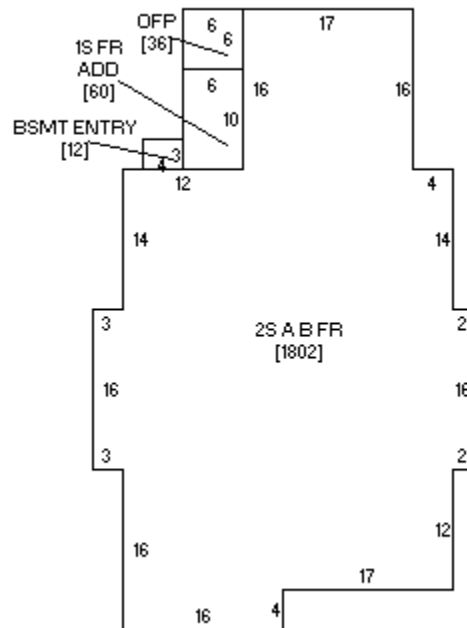
The current arrangement has suited the college just fine for the past 23 years, according to Waldo Walker, the college's vice president for college services who is retiring this year, and aside from a few changes to be made this summer to improve office space on the third floor, there are no plans to move the present tenants out of Nollen House.

So it appears that the musical chairs existence of one of Grinnell's most distinguished residences may be at an end, and it will continue to rule the scene on Park Street in stately splendor from its vantage point across from the campus.

Henry G. and Mary Fidelia Little House: the house was sold to Grinnell College in 1937, Little sold previous home to the college for use as a president's house, built this one.

The mystery:

"H. G. Little starts foundation for a new house on his lot "just north of his own residence. It will be about as large as his other house which stands on the corner of Park St. and 6th Ave.," (*Herald*, August 14, 1885)

"H. G. Little is doing an extensive job of grading about his new house on Park Street. The house will soon be completed and it will be a fine property to rent," (*Herald*, September 22, 1885).

"Mr. Warren Little has laid a new sidewalk in front of his residence on Park Street," (this one?) (*Herald*, August 7, 1885).

So presumably he had a house on the corner of 6th and built to the north of it-1894 directory places his residence at 1127 Park, so is this in reference to 1133 Park?

David R. and Bessie Warburton House: Warburton was a lumber dealer. The \$4,500 1900 house was said to be “the handsomest house built the past season...one of the prittiest Grinnell affords and is certainly a model of attractive interior” (*Herald*, January 1, 1901). Third house on this corner, one lost to the cyclone, another moved north and demolished, and this one. Two successive college preparatory school principals, J. Fred Smith and Chas. H. Horn, built the earlier two houses.

This is the third house on this corner-D. Smoke’s first house fronted onto 8th Street and was lost in the cyclone. The second, a two-story Italianate plan, replaced it and fronted east. J. Fred Smith, principal of the college preparatory academy bought the house in March 1892. It was moved north to make room for this one. Chas. H. Horn, also the prep.college principal, bought the house in 1903. This was known as the “Faculty House.”

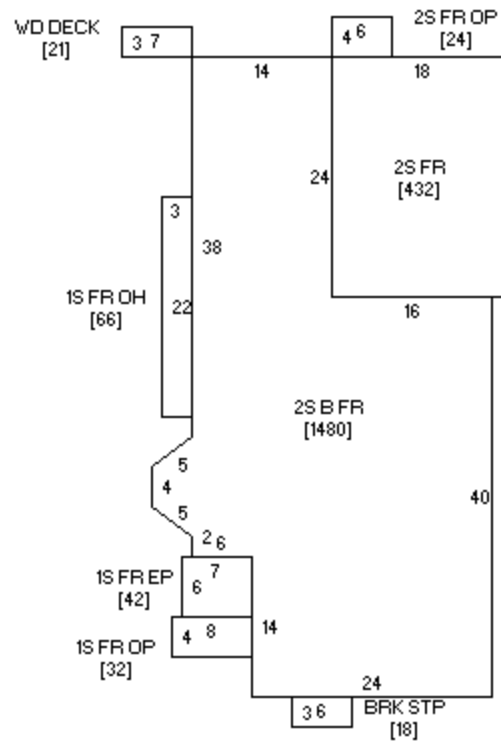


Bicycle Cage

George Ross built a “cycle whirl” in 1902. It was portable and measured 13 feet in diameter at its base, and 18 feet at its top. His “wheel” was from the National Cycle Company. He hauled the contraption to Malcolm in mid-August. This image seems to lack the extreme taper that is described by these figures, so this might be a preliminary version. There is no indication of any interior ramp, necessary to start the wheel on the sidewalls. The local account does not provide a specific location, doesn’t even specify its presence within the city but this is pretty obvious, assuming the picture and account overlap (*Herald*, August 15, 19, 1902).

W. A. Preston built a double cycle whirl with a ramp two years later. It featured cross-over tracks. The sidewalls were five feet high and had a 12-foot base diameter, and a 16-foot upper diameter. Again, no location is given, nor is the contraption described as being portable. Perhaps the cross over consisted of a reverse ramp on the ground that allowed the rider to simply reverse direction? (*Herald*, August 5, 1904).

Preston is not found in a search of this document and George Ross, for this time period, is found only at 1209 Broad Street, which nicely puts him close to this location.

Chapter 18: The Fellows House

A grand house with an orange tile roof on the north end of Broad Street across from Merrill Park elicits near-universal admiration, and has a history that has touched many of Grinnell's most eminent enterprises.

This house, known as the "Fellows house" after its builder, is surrounded by a spacious landscaped lawn, anchoring one end of the block between Tenth and Eleventh Avenues.

Speaking to an earlier time of gracious living, it sits to the north of another large home with classic appearance, this one designed by the eminent Walter Burley Griffin of the Prairie School of architecture.

The Fellows house at 1527 Broad St., with its charcoal gray stucco, gray shutters and classic tile roof, lends a distinct air to the "end of the town" before Merrill Park Circle, and emphasis in the last few years on the design of its grounds has called attention to the grandeur of the property.

A fabled feature of the stucco house, now home to Mark and Regina Bjorndal, is a paneled billiard room on the second floor in the best manner of English country houses.

The house has filled a number of interesting functions, and at one time was under consideration as a possible location for the Iowa Peace Institute.

It was built by Jesse Fellows, a graduate of Grinnell College and

a principal partner in the Grinnell Washing Machine Company, and his wife, Maude. Construction of the home began in 1914 and was completed in 1918.

The house is characterized by large rooms. Its formal entry hall, adjoined by an intimate study, is flanked by a French-doored dining room linked by a butler's pantry to the kitchen and a living room that runs the full width of the house. A private suite on the first floor is in a wing that also holds the billiard room, and spacious solariums extend to the south on both the first and second floors. The second and third floors each have bedrooms.



The so-called Fellows house was built from 1914 to 1918 by Jesse and Maude Fellows.

The Poweshiek Club, a now-defunct men's study and discussion group of which Fellows was a member, often held its meetings with the members seated in high chairs that surrounded the billiard table in the billiard room, according to a member.

The washing machine company enjoyed some early successes, but lost ground to its competitor, the Maytag Company, just up the road in Newton. The failure of the washing machine company and some of its interlocking companies in the late 1920's resulted in the declining fortunes of many Grinnellians, including the Fellowesses. In fact, as one Grinnellian has said, because of that failure the Depression of the 1930's was visited upon Grinnell long before it reached the remainder of the country.

As a consequence, the Fellowesses moved to a smaller home on Tenth Avenue and Mr. Fellows became superintendent of buildings and grounds at Grinnell College.

House becomes college dorm

Their home became the property of Grinnell College, which named it Macy House for Jesse Macy, its famed political science professor, and from the early 1930's it was used to house political science majors, including a student named Jim Stauss who was chairman of the house and later became a dean and acting president of the college.

L.G. Chrysler, a vice president of the college and subsequently mayor of Grinnell, acquired the house from the college and returned it to a spacious home for his family.

In 1950 the house was purchased by Pearl Nollen, an avid golfer whose husband Henry Nollen, a long-time president of the former Bankers Life Company in Des Moines, was a brother of Dr. John Nollen, president of Grinnell College. She herself was the sister of A.B. Hamilton, a Grinnell real estate and insurance executive.

John and Henry Nollen and their brother Gerard, who was president of another Des Moines insurance company, were grandsons of Pastor Scholte, a native of Holland who was founder of the town of Pella and Central College.

Mrs. Nollen once remarked that in addition to the family affiliations that brought her here, she bought the home because "it was the most

like the houses on Grand Avenue in Des Moines" to which she was accustomed.

Provides commodious quarters

Mrs. Nollen and Hamilton, natives of Marengo, were joined in occupying the large house by Blanche McGurk, sister of the late Mrs. A.B. Hamilton, who had retired as director of the University of Iowa College of Nursing, and by A.B. Hamilton's son David. The house provided commodious quarters for the four relatives. A frequent guest was Eletha Harrier, a teacher and cousin who had been raised in Des Moines by Mrs. Nollen.

Rick Bierman, who purchased the home in the 1970s, and his then wife Susan McKibbin Bierman, devoted a great deal of time to restoring the interior of the house, installing a modern kitchen, studying architectural styles and appropriate furnishings and adding art work. Subsequent owners Gene and Patty Bauer continued this effort.

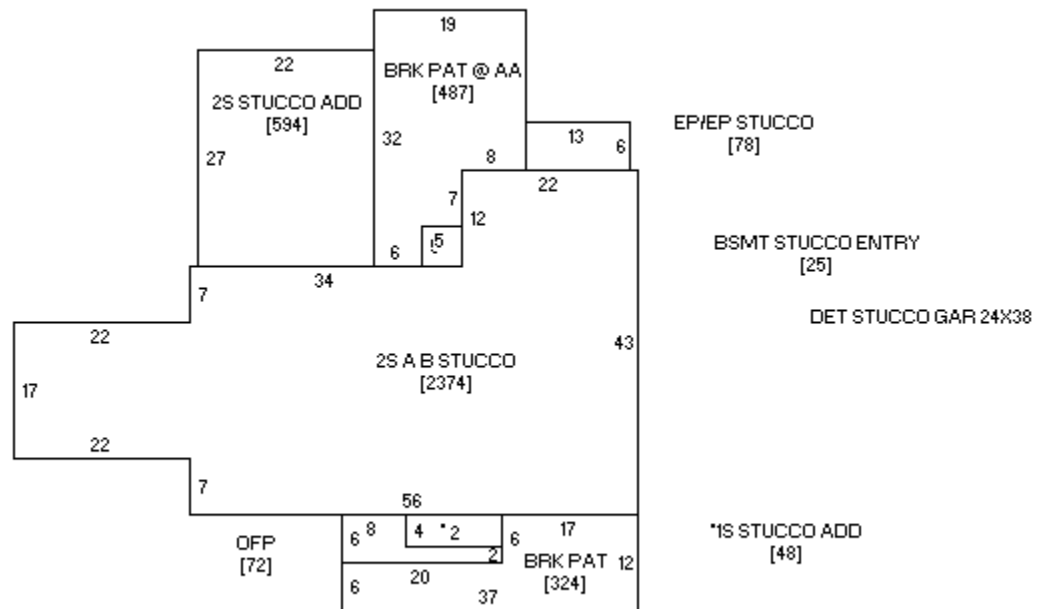
The Bjorndals purchased the house in 1988 and have carried on this devotion to the house. Bjorndal credits his wife for her taste in their improvements, saying she is 100 percent responsible, as art is one of her principal interests and she enjoys design.

By the process of elimination, the following account is assumed to go with this house. It fits no other house and there is the requisite barn. If correct, then this is the oldest existing Spaulding House, the earliest having been moved off or lost with the construction of 1103 Main.

Messrs. Wessel & Duffin assisted by Mr. H. Janes, have about completed for Mr. H. W. Spaulding, one of the handsomest and most substantial residences in the city, on the west side of Main St. between 6th and 7th avenues. The house is two full stories, swell fronts east and south, and presents a very attractive external appearance. Upon entering the front door you step into a commodious hall 11x12 feet, from which doors lead into the parlor and sitting room and an easy stairway to the second story. The parlor and sitting room conform in shape to the swells on the east and south; the former is 13x16 feet, the latter 15x19, and adjoining this on the north is a bedroom 13x14. These three rooms are connected with folding doors and can be thrown practically into one room. Leading from the bedroom is a bathroom, and from the sitting room a dining room and then a kitchen. In the latter two are built all the modern conveniences in the way of cupboards, closets, etc. Upstairs there are seven rooms with large closets in each. The cellar is an ordinary house in itself. It is divided into several rooms with cement floors. In one of these rooms is a Boyington hot air furnace, with which the entire house is warmed. There are registers and ventilators in every room in the house, besides a fireplace in the sitting room and provision for stoves in case of a emergency. The woodwork inside is what is known as the Eastlake finish, and is very neat. The carpenters expect to complete their work this week. W. W. Sargent is painting the rooms as fast as the woodwork is done. He is finishing the rooms in different colors. The outside is painted a light cream, trimmed with bronze green. The house is unusually well built from the foundation up. The mason work was done by George Sampson. A barn 22x24 convenient and tasty, graces the rear end of the lot, to which a driveway leads from the street on the north side of the house. The lot is being graded nicely and will be devoted to lawn purposes. The property will cost Mr. Spaulding about \$5,000 (*Herald*, September 28, 1886).

H. W. Spaulding has recently built a fine large barn, which improves his property considerably (*Herald*, September 8, 1885).
